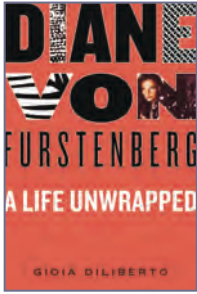
Magna Carta: The Making and Legacy of the Great Charter

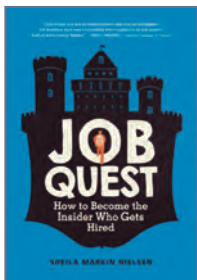
WFMT: The First 63 Years

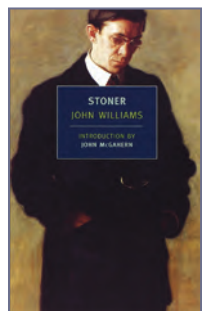

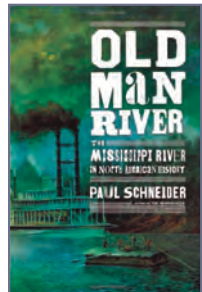

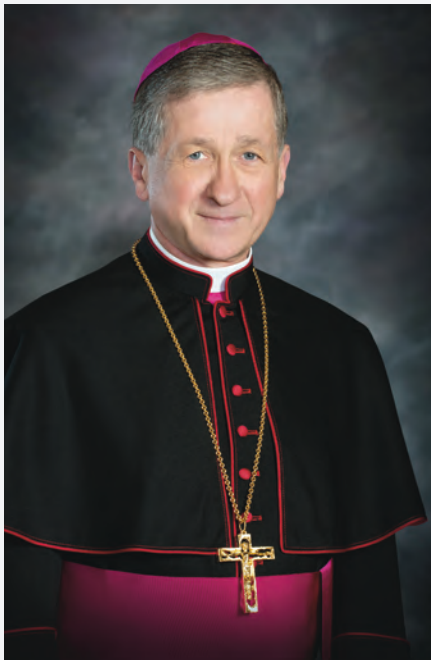
